

bring to Chicago more than 50 performers, representing a broad cross-section of American folk song and music. Attendance of 4,000 persons during the period is expected.

This year's festival includes a special Saturday morning children's concert, in addition to the three evening concerts, lectures, guitar and banjo workshops, discussion groups, folk dancing, and a Wing-Ding with, hopefully, as many as 1,000 instruments playing at one time.

The three public concerts are scheduled for 8:15 p.m. Friday, Saturday, and Sunday in Mandel Hall, 57th and University. The children's concert will be given at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in Mandel Hall. Other activities will take place in Ida Noyes Hall, 1212 E. 59th.

Student groups are expected from the Universities of Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, and Cornell as well as Oberlin College and Swarthmore. A special busload of thirty-eight is coming from Washington, D. C. with students from George Washington University and American University. Others are planning to come from Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Danville, Illinois; and the Minnesota Folk Arts Society in Minneapolis.

Performing at the children's concert are Jack Elliott, who will be dressed as a cowboy and sing children's songs and play the guitar, and Ella Jenkins and Win Stracke, both well-known in Chicago for their concerts and children's shows on radio and television. Several campus organizations are buying blocks of tickets for under-privileged children to attend the concert.

The evening concerts will be held at 8:15 p.m. in Mandel Hall 57th and University. Performances will be by Jean and Edna Ritchie, The Blue Grass Gentlemen, the Staple Singers, Jack

Stracke, Jack Elliott and Ella Jenkins will perform at the children's concert 10:30 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 3. To emcee the festival will be Stads Terkel, Archie Green and Bob Cosbey.

Among the lectures to be presented at the festival are "The Academic Folklorist and the Folk Song Revival," by Dr. D. K. Wilgus, professor of English from Western Kentucky State College; "Shifting Definitions of Folk Songs," by Sam Eskin; "Folk Song Collecting in the Southern Mountains" by John Cohen of the New Lost City Ramblers, and "Folk Song Collecting in the British Isles" by Jean Ritchie.

The Sunday Folk Dance takes place from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. at Ida Noyes Hall. Leading the dances will be Bob Abson, President of the Chicago Folk Dance Leadership Council and leader of the North Austin Folk Dancers. Exhibition dancing will take place from 2:00 to 2:30 p.m. by members of the Folk Dance Associates performing Balkan dances;
